Course Outline

Course Description

This course will present Aristotle as a systematic philosopher whose views on logic, metaphysics, epistomology, science, nature, and the mind structure and reinforce his views on ethics, friendship, politics, and works of literature. Reading assignments, lectures, and written assignments will focus primarily on Aristotle's texts, though we will also use a recent book by Christopher Shields to illuminate these texts and to highlight important interpretive and critical issues.

Required Texts

- 1. Aristotle, Aristotle: Selections, Terrence Irwin and Gail Fine, editors (Hackett, 1995).
- 2. Christopher Shields, Aristotle (Routledge, 2007).

Evaluation

- 1. 13 weekly homework assignments: 50% of the final grade.
 - a. Homework assignments will consist of reconstructing and/or evaluating arguments or passages from the assigned text for the class on which they are due. Most assignments will require about one page of writing.
 - b. Assignments must be typed, double-spaced in a 12-point font, printed out, and ready to submit at the beginning of the class on which they are due.
 - c. During lecture you may correct by hand any errors you have made in your typed assignment for that day, and I will award you partial credit of up to 50% for your in-class corrections. So, for example, if your typed homework assignment would have received a score of 6 out of 10 points, and if you correct your homework's mistakes by hand by the end of the class on the day on which it is due, then you will receive a score of 8 out of 10 points.
 - d. One purpose of these assignments and the grading policy described in (1c) is to have you engage with the lecture in a more sophisticated way and participate in class. To this end, you must submit your assignments in person. Emailed assignments and assignments submitted by a classmate will not be accepted.
 - e. Since these assignments will be of varying length and difficulty, some will be worth more than others towards your final grade. Each assignment will be worth between 3% and 8% of your final grade.
- 2. One closed-book in-class midterm examination, on Monday, March 4th: 20% of the final grade.
- 3. One open-book take-home final examination, due via Blackboard by Friday, April 19th: 20% of the final grade.
- 4. Class Participation: 10% of the final grade.
 - a. Class participation includes participating in classroom discussions, visiting office hours, and corresponding with me via email about the material of the course.
- 5. A passing grade on each of the two main components of the course—homework assignments and exams—is essential if the student is to pass the course as a whole.
